Ms. Bryant serves as the Executive Director of the Black Mental Health Alliance for Education and Consultation, Inc. (BMHA) in Baltimore, Maryland. The primary mission of the non-profit organization is to provide and promote a holistic, culturally relevant approach to the development and maintenance of optimal mental health for African Americans and other people of color. She serves on the Governor's Women's Health Promotion Council, Maryland Coalition for Children, Youth and Families Board of Directors, Institute for Mental Health Ministry, Inc. Board of Directors, Maryland Health Partners Advisory Board, State of Maryland Advisory Council on Mental Hygiene, and is a member of the American Public Health Association.

Prior to taking the helm of executive director of the Black Mental Health Alliance for Education and Consultation, Tracee E. Bryant, a Houston, Texas native, functioned in several capacities at a national Healthy Start Program entitled Great Expectations Foundation, Inc. in New Orleans, Louisiana. Her roles included health educator, special assistant to the executive director and consortium director. Ms. Bryant has also conducted research at Tulane University Medical Center's Community Medicine Urban Health Studies Department and University of Texas MD Anderson Cancer Center in Houston, Texas.

Ms. Bryant completed her undergraduate studies in Biology at Hampton University and received her Master of Public Health from Tulane School of Public Health and Tropical Medicine with a dual concentration in Maternal and Child Health and Health Communication/Education. She is also a Certified Health Education Specialist.
